

Some 15 photographers were awarded prizes this year in the 41st annual exhibit of the International Photographic Society, now on show in the HQ1 Gallery.

The exhibit, which runs until June 3, showcases 114 images by 30 photographers from the society, which includes members from both the Fund and World Bank Staff and families.

Top prize for the second year in a row went to Dirk Mevis, an ED's advisor, for his photo of an airplane coming into Reagan National airport over Rosslyn. It is a composite of three 30-second long exposures, creating a streak of light in the sky that is reflected in the waters of the Potomac. Mevis says he called the photograph "Tom Waits" because it reminded him of the Tom Waits song, "The Piano Has Been Drinking (Not Me)."

Tidal Basin Still Life" by long-time IPS member Frederic Cochard won second prize—it shows a leaf adrift in a tidal basin. Mevis also won third prize for a photo of his young son perched at the mouth of a slide at a park, about to begin a journey into the unknown.

In addition to the top three awards, there were 14 honorable mentions. They were among the 15 photographers who received awards from IPS President Mary Wilson at a reception held earlier this month. ED Willy Kiekens was on hand to applaud his staff's achievements. "We try to be creative in all aspects of our work in this office," he said.

The jury consisted of three local photographers, including Heather Goss who spoke briefly at the reception. Praising the "amazing photographs from all over the world," Ms. Goss said that the best of them "capture the moment ... when a story is about to be told."
