March Speakers/Judge: Sahm Doherty-Sefton

"The Extraordinary Moment"

Sahm Doherty-Sefton was the first woman photographer on the masthead of Time magazine, where she remained for more than 25 years. She lived and worked in both New York and Washington D.C., covering a wide diversity of subjects - sports, fashion, politics, the arts, and social unrest. She was Time's White House photographer during the Carter Administration. Based successively in Johannesburg, Cairo, Bonn, and London, she chronicled major international events. Her assignments have included coverage of wars in Cyprus, Zimbabwe and Beirut. In London she was the European picture editor of Time for six years. After her return to America, she produced and filmed television documentaries.

Reporting for Time Magazine from Johannesburg, Cairo, Bonn, London, and numerous other travel assignments, Sahm Doherty-Sefton photographed significant historic moments and important figures.

Her presentation was enlivened by anecdotes she recalled about particular shots. For example how cold it was on the morning of Jimmy Carter's inauguration, so much so that her assistant had to hold the tripod to prevent it from shaking. Or how easy it was to walk into 10 Downing St in London, where she photographed Mrs. Thatcher frequently. And also how she pretended to be a tourist simply boating alongside the Shah of Iran and his family who were not fond of photographers.

Working for a news magazine, a photographer's job is to manage to take him or herself out of sometimes tense situations, to become almost invisible, while at the same time being close enough to the action to feel as part of the private moments that may be happening during very public events.

Capturing important moments takes preparation. Doherty-Sefton said a photo-journalist must have a "mental repertoire" of the equipment she will need, the location, where she will stand, what the subject may do, and of course a bit of luck. And to make sure to leave assumptions at the door (François Mitterrand is not as tall as she thought!)

She photographed many high-level meetings, a difficult subject: the tables are often messy and the photographer must strive to find personality and feelings in the people she photographs.

She presented photos from Africa (Chief funeral in Namibia, Steve Biko's funeral in South Africa), the Middle East (Beirut, Arafat, Saddat) and Europe (Berlin wall, the United Kingdom).

She explained how hard it is to photograph fighting: the photographer needs to stay far enough away from the action to avoid injury and cannot rely on movement or sound like a video would.

Back in New York, Doherty-Sefton did some fashion photography as well as a photo essay for Life on women getting out of prison.

During the questions and answers session, she explained that she started with photography after she moved to New York and became a photographer's assistant. She learned by taking many photos, looking at good pictures and countless contact sheets. From an early age, she had a good eye for photo composition.

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In her early years as a photographer, she said that witnessing historic events through her camera lens made her see that high level decision-makers were all human. It seems that nowadays, the "photo op" style has taken that quality away.

Now living on the Maryland's Eastern Shore, she photographs nature, which she says requires a totally different set of skills, because she can't rely on the drama that a personality would add to the picture.

Note: Ms. Doherty-Sefton said she was impressed by the gallery of photos on the IPS website, both in black and white and color.


What got you started on photography?

By seeing and photographing creatively, I can tell a powerful story without words or leave the interpretation of the story completely to viewers.

It was my first image that was exhibited at an IPS annual exhibit.






